OPENING SPEECH JANUSZ LACNY **IRU PRESIDENT**

Brussels, Belgium 28 January 2010

Ladies and gentlemen, Dear Members, Dear Mrs. President,

I have both the honour and the pleasure to extend, on behalf of the International Road Transport Union, and its educational arm, the IRU Academy, a warm welcome to both the speakers and the audience of this seminar.

First, allow me to say a few words about the IRU Academy. As some of you may know, the IRU Academy was founded in 1999. This initiative was in response to a clear need of the industry represented by the IRU members.

Since its inception and with the introduction of the CPC programme for Transport Operators, the IRU Academy was able to rapidly expand its geographical scope, now having 40 ATIs in 33 countries, spanning 3 continents. Today 4 professional training programmes are made available to its Accredited Training Institutes.

Let's now focus on Driver Competence.

To start with, I would like to highlight the importance of having this seminar. This seminar, which brings together experts from all over the world, representing both the public and private sectors all working towards the same goal of success, is nothing short of exemplary.



Today, as mentioned before, we will find out and analyse the results of a study conducted in the European Union on the implementation of the Driver's Directive. Ladies and Gentlemen of the road transport industry, we know that there is no greater asset for a business than an employee who can perform work with competence and takes pride in his professionalism. This is the key to attracting and retaining professional drivers.

From yesterday's discussions in the Seminar on "Image and Employment in Road Transport", we clearly understand that shaping an attractive profession relies on many elements. Internationally recognised Training and professional development as it is provided through the IRU Academy and all its Accredited Training Institutes is one essential component to achieve this goal. Not addressing this topic properly will jeopardise the underlying objectives to attract and retain in our great profession the staff, labour forces and drivers we need to continue to drive progress.

I wish all of us a fruitful seminar and I am very much looking forward to the interesting presentations and discussions that will follow.
